# **Written Reports from Directors**

#### President's

The association had a relatively uneventful year in 2016. We started the year soliciting feedback on the Statutory Declaration. It became evident from the feedback received that the majority of the membership was in favour of retaining some form of the document. We continue to work toward a solution that will fit in today's digital age and global economy while retain the intention and validity of the document. At the same time, we are proceeding cautiously given the political realities in the province.

There have been no major legislative or regulatory changes that effect the auction industry over the last year. There are still 2 ongoing issues: 1) prohibition of public buyers at wholesale vehicle auctions and 2) length of time that shops have to place liens on vehicles (30 days). We continue to work on these issues. There have been some major changes at the Alberta Motor Vehicle Industry Council (AMVIC) of which the AAA is a member (Wade to cover).

The association had a successful year financially with a profit of \$40M, thanks mainly to a very successful convention last year in Calgary.

We held 4 directors' meetings over the past year. I would like to thank the directors and the past presidents for all their hard work on their respective committees. In addition to the directors' meetings I attended 2 meetings in Edmonton. One was the annual meeting on the AMVIC society and the other was a meeting with the Deputy Minister of Service Alberta, again primarily revolving around AMVIC.

At our last full board meeting in early January the board passed a motion to establish 2, \$500 scholarships. One is for individuals that have attended an auction school within the past year or plan on attending on auction school within the up coming year. This will be known as the Bud Haynes Memorial Scholarship. The other is for the child or grandchild of an Association member who is pursuing higher education of any type. Application forms and qualifying criteria are available through the AAA office.

Ken McGregor of the Auctioneers Association of Ontario reported changes to the estate laws in Ontario required estate trustees to obtain accurate information proving an estate's value. The province therefore suggests executors should use professional appraisers. An Auctioneer can be sure of dealing with the trustee by seeing the paperwork associated with the estate.

A competition held at the 2016 Auctioneers Association of Ontario was won by Fredrick Bodnarus a member of Alberta and Saskatchewan Auctioneers Associations. The Livestock Markets Association of Canada Championships was held this year at the Brussels Livestock market in Brussels, Ontario. This competition brought competitors together from Alberta to Quebec. The competition was won by Ryan Hurlburt of Saskatchewan. Second place went to Kirk Goldsmith and third to Ryan Konynenbelt both of Alberta.

For any interested the 2017 Auctioneers Association of Ontario Convention will be held Feb. 18 to 21 in Cambridge, Ontario. Presentations will be made by the Ontario Motor Vehicle Industry Council; social media and auctions; as well as Real Estate Auctions.

#### SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS

With help from John Arnold, and input from the board, we are extremely proud to introduce the Bud Haynes Educational Scholarship, a \$500 endowment towards tuition costs of any licensed auction

school. Applicants must be attending or have completed auction school in the past calendar year and will submit an essay outlining why they would be a worthy candidate for the scholarship. A panel from the board, as well as Dot Haynes/Linda Baggaley will select the winning candidate each year and present the scholarship at our annual convention.

The second scholarship is an annual \$500 award given to Association members or family members who are pursuing postsecondary education. # **AAA Scholarship Program**

- Have attended at least one annual convention and annual general meeting of the Association.

For those applying for the general scholarship you must have a parent or grandparent that is a member of the Association and be enrolled at post secondary institution. You must be nominated by the association member.

# **Auction Trust Accounts**

Please be advised that the Public Auctions Regulation under the *Fair Trading Act* requires auction sales businesses to maintain a trust account for the deposit of money received from the sale of goods sold by public auctions that it holds. The auction sales business must maintain the trust account in a bank, loan corporation, trust corporation, credit union or treasury branch in Alberta.

The relevant sections of the regulation are posted below:

#### Trust established

- **15** (1) An auction sales business is the trustee of any money received from the sale of goods by public auction that it holds, and the business holds the money in trust to be paid out in accordance with this Regulation.
- (2) The auction sales business must deposit all of the money received from the sale of goods, without making any deduction, into a trust account described in section 16
  - (a) with respect to money received during the sale by public auction,

- within 3 days after the end of the sale, and
- (b) with respect to money received after the end of the sale by public auction, within 3 days of receiving the money.

#### Trust account

- **16** (1) An auction sales business must maintain a trust account for the deposit of money received from the sale of goods sold by public auctions that it holds.
- (2) An auction sales business must maintain the trust account in a bank, loan corporation, trust corporation, credit union or treasury branch in Alberta.
- (3) No auction sales business may deposit any money into a trust account under subsection (1) except for money received from the sale of goods by public auctions that it holds.

# **Mechanics Liens**

When taking vehicles or farm equipment on consignment as an auction company you should be aware of mechanic's liens. In Alberta mechanics liens are administered under the Garage Keepers Lien Act. This act is one of the shortest pieces of legislation in the Province of Alberta at just 12 pages and is available by googling "Alberta mechanics liens"

The Act states that a business that stores, repairs or maintains motor vehicles and farm equipment has up to 21 days after completion of the work or when the owner picks up the vehicle to register a financing statement under PPSA providing the owner of the vehicle or equipment or their agent signed the invoice or statement of account. If they do not register a financing statement with the 21day period, the right to do so expires and they become an unsecured creditor.

This means that the shop where the work was done has an unregistered lien on the vehicle or equipment for up to 21 days after completing the work or releasing to the owner. What are the ramifications for an auction business? If you take a vehicle or

piece of farm equipment on consignment and do a lien search it could come back clean. Subsequently a repair business could register a lien for work done on the vehicle within the past 21 days. You sell the vehicle assuming it is free and clear only to have the lien show up after the sale.

How can you reduce the risk of this happening? When taking a vehicle or farm equipment on consignment ask the consignor if they have taken the vehicle out of storage, had any repairs done to it or accessories added within the last 21 days. If they answer yes, ask to see the paid invoice. For auction businesses that have their own consignor contracts you may want to add a clause to your contract, under advice from legal council, to cover this if you do not already have it in your contract.

For those businesses that do not have a consignor contract, you may want to consider using one that includes mechanics liens. As with all legal matters, you should consult your own attorney in regards to this issue. This article is for information purposes only and is not to be interpreted as legal advice.

What, in your opinion is a good auctioneer?

Of course I made it my goal to do my best at everything I sold, but my main passion was selling livestock. But I was pretty happy selling anything!

#### Who in the Alberta auction profession inspires you and is your idea of a great auctioneer?

I know many auctioneers that have directly or indirectly assisted my success. To name a few would not be fair to so many other that have contributed to the auction profession. They have supported their communities in so may ways. That makes them all "Top Notch Auctioneers"

Talking with Fred and getting his profile has been a most interesting and informative discussion. Fred and Janet have had an exciting career in serving the auction community in the Eastern Central area of Alberta.

Fred was born on a dairy farm in the Ottawa Valley. In high school, he became involved clerking for an older auctioneer selling dairy cattle He was intrigued by the chant and this was the inspiration that would lead him into the auction profession in Alberta.

After graduating from high school, he was employed at Bell telephone installing telephones. This was an occupation that had no appeal and McDiarmid decided to go to Alberta in 1966. An opportunity was available to work at the Dean Olseth Ranch, 6 miles South of Veteran, AB.

Fred took his new occupation with much vigor and he soon was calfing cows along with general ranch and farm duties. This venture lasted for 12 years and give McDiarmid a thorough understanding of the cattle industry which would assist him in his auctioneering career.

After graduation from Western College from Auctioneering in 1967, Fred had a desire to be active with local auction marts. McDiarmid realized to get experience he worked without pay. He was only involved with miscellaneous items and general auction set up but it was a start.

He laboured long and hard and after many months he had the confidence to approach Veteran local auctioneer, **Wm. Checkel** to help him at his sales. This was Fred's big break and within a **short time was asked** to help him on all his sales.

It becomes **part of your personality and McDiarmid reached that milestone.** Fred recalls in his early days that to receive a comment or endorsement that you will make it as an auctioneer is a real booster. Ron Haglund, a cattle auctioneer was impressed and took the

During the ensuing years of the 80's and 90's farm sales were fast and plenty. The need for used farm and ranch equipment was high and their sales ranged from \$50,000 to \$300,000 plus. HIs firm over 20 years has done over 120 sales which did include estate and general consignment sales plus cattle mart sales. It was busy busy.

Fred and Janet did numerous charity auctions for local clubs, churches, Duck's Unlim-

ited, local school, 4H clubs and more. McDiarmid for the past 24 years has given his services to the Wild Rose Draft Horse Association at Olds, AB where each May he hits the hammer.

Fred has had tremendous support from his wife. Janet who he married in 1974 and have a family of two - Lesley and Leigh with grandchildren that keeps Ma & Pa busy.

In 1975, he arranged to purchase a 2400 ace ranch, 8 miles North of Veteran, AB. There was a house and a set of corrals. It was a vast undertaking but that young married couple had a vision that this ranch could facilitate all their dreams.
